English		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In GCSE English Literature -there are two BAME poets in the Eduqas Anthology: Rita Dove and Imtiaz Dharker. One poem explores a particular relationship and the other about the faith found in the slums of Mumbai.</li> <li>• In GCSE Language Paper 2, we explore non-fiction texts which centre on the BLM protests in the US.</li> <li>• Students have access to year specific reading lists, which have the BAME writers and LGBTQ+ writers highlighted. (On English subject section of website)</li> <li>• In the Summer Reading Challenge, BAME writers have been included and prominence given to particular issues they raise. For example, one book for KS3 is called 'The Bone Sparrow' by Zana Frailion about a child living in a refugee detention camp.</li> <li>• New for 2020: our literary heritage poetry SOW in Year 8 will be replaced with Poems from Other Cultures to add more diversity to our curriculum.</li> </ul>

Key attitudes include respect for all, open mindedness, appreciation and wonder, and self-awareness. Links with art curriculum: 'Spiritual arts' (cultural awareness being a common theme)  Diversity in religion, including atheism. Pentecostal Christian worship. Representations of Jesus in different cultures. Buddhism, especially Indian-sub continent and far east Asia. Jewish, Christian, Islamic and secular interpretations of the Hebrew Bible.  Diversity within Islam and Sikhism. Ethical issues including racism, xenophobia, world poverty, treatment of criminals (specific links to BLM). Western 'stereotypes' of the East, e.g. through film and media.  Diversity within Christianity and Islam. Christian and Islamic festivals around the world. Ethical issues including peaceful and violent protest, war, terrorism, polygamy and arranged marriages (many of which incorporate discussions and issues that relate to race). Conflict in N. Ireland and Palestine based on

		religious, and sometimes racial distinctions. Study of Martin Luther King, Jr. and links to Malcom X (e.g. Civil Rights Movement, black panthers...).

	10 and 11- GCSE	<b>Politics and Participation</b> - Protest and campaigning- positive role models- Marcus Rashford and the campaign for free school meals over Summer break, Black Lives Matter campaign. Discussion on representativeness of MPs in relation to gender/ ethnicity etc and its influence on democracy. <b>Life in Modern Britain</b> - multiculturalism, immigration, diversity, ethnic make-up of the UK, tolerance, racism, discrimination and types of discrimination. The media and bias within the media- Islamophobia. Black Lives Matter protests. Discussion on global organisations including The Commonwealth and the ideas of colonialism and some countries leaving due to viewing this as 'neo-colonialism'. <b>Rights and Responsibilities</b> - equality laws, legal system and ethnicity, Stephen Lawrence and the McPherson Report, discussion on crime rates in BAME communities and reasons for this including bias within the legal system. Discussion on representativeness of judges in relation to gender/ social class/ ethnicity and the effect on bias. <b>Active Citizenship</b> - students work in groups to carry out campaigning, they are able to campaign on matters to do with diversity.
